

formulate a road map for the development of nanotechnology. According to her, it was pertinent to note that the current trends in research and development have shown that nanotechnology has emerged as the next frontier for the exploration of science and the development of new technologies. She noted that experts have also projected that a multi-billion dollar global market would emerge over the next two decades from this technology that impacts such diverse fields as medicine, agriculture, energy, water purification, information technology and electronics.

She continued that the promise of creating super-strong and light materials for space exploration of restoring environmental systems on a molecular level, of injecting patients with machines to make repairs are all part of the promise of Nanotechnology. Every area of industry, health and environment can be improved by the inception of Nanotechnology- which is the ability to fabricate, repair and organize on atomic or molecular scales.

Furthermore, Prof. Osuji a Professor of Physics said that it was pertinent to note that the developed world and even some emerging economies have strong bases in nanotechnology within their research communities. Stating that rapid growth in interest in this field requires us in Nigeria to become globally directive and to achieve this there was need for the Nigerian government to put in place strong political will, relevant national policies and sustained research and development in the country.

It is our desire to fast tract development through human and infrastructural capacity building, consequently reducing the gap between the developed and the

emerging economies hence this conference and workshop. She also commended the MD/CEO OilServe Ltd Group of Companies, Sir. Engr. Emeka Okwuosa for his continual sponsorship of the conference.

Delivering the first lecture, the former President, African University of Science and Technology Abuja, Prof. Wole Soboyejo in his paper titled: "New Frontiers for Materials for Health, Energy and the Environment" said that science and technology were the major engines of development. Adding that materials have always been a major driver in technological change. Where alloys and semiconductors are hard materials, polymers are soft materials.

He went further to explain that examples of Strategy for Systems-Based Interdisciplinary Approach to Research are Advanced Materials (Bio and Nano) which include Health and wellbeing and alternative energy and also societal development such as affordable infrastructure as in recycling of agricultural industrial waste and Energy harvesting from the walls of buildings.

Prof. Soboyejo stressed that his goal is to inspire young people to think beyond the box and make use of scientific approach to tackle issues.

The Chief Scientist & Research Group Leader, Council for Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR), Pretoria, South Africa, Prof. Kenneth I. Ozoemena in his paper tagged: "Nanostructured Energy Storage Materials for Renewable Energy Technologies" disclosed that according to World Bank, 20% of Africans have access to electricity.

While stating the importance of energy, he said, "Energy is intricately linked to human prosperity; energy is pivotal to

economic growth and energy is the reason for most human problems and in order to have renewable Energy in Africa, the key drivers are Climate action (curbing environmental pollution) and Economics & improved quality of life (Africa, women and energy). While pointing that the implications would be clean mass transportation; clean energy generation (utility) and off-grid energy for the rural poor (Africa)".

Prof. Ozoemena quoted the *Chief Executive, Oando, Adewale Tinubu as saying*, "Africa does not have the time for traditional power roll-outs. The continent cannot transform without power. We are losing the opportunity to leapfrog out of poverty by failing to invest in energy" and *Kandeh Kolleh Yumkella (former UN under-S-G)* said that "Without access to affordable, reliable, sustainable energy, Africa cannot really take advantage of the 4th industrial revolution. Governments "should do for the energy sector what they did for mobile telephone: you deregulate, you privatise, you incentivise, private capital will come in".

It was a rare gathering of elites, scientists, physicists, intellectual power house, major industry players from across Africa, Asia and Europe and America.

In order to address security challenges that have bedeviled the nation through cutting edge research, the Director General, Nigerian Army Resource Centre (NARC), Major General J. G. S Hamakim paid a courtesy visit to the University of Nigeria, Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Benjamin Chukwuma Ozumba in a bid to seek for collaboration in the area of research, seminar, symposium, workshop and conferences.

Speaking during the visit, the DG who was represented by the Senior Research Fellow, Nigerian Army Resource Centre, Major General Ijioma Nwokolo Ijioma said that the centre was the youngest branch in the Nigerian Army.

According to him, the choice of UNN as one of the Universities to collaborate with was based on the position of UNN not only in Nigeria and Africa but in the world

with respect to research.

“UNN has made remarkable landmark with regards to her recent webometric ranking which placed her first in Nigeria, 14th in Africa and subsequently 1500 in the world” he said.

The Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Benjamin Chukwuma Ozumba while lauding the army pledged the University's support to collaborate with them in the area of research while stressing that the solution to the countries challenges lies in the institutions of learning.

It is worthy of note that the Nigerian Army Resource Centre (NARC) was established on 20th November 2015 as a national 'Think-Tank' aimed at furthering the interest in and knowledge of the art, science and literature of the Defence Services. It is responsible for proffering solutions to the Defence and security issues confronting the Nigerian Army (NA) in particular and the nation in general. This is actualized through research and issue-based discourses including but not limited to brainstorming sessions, seminars, symposia and

workshops involving serving and retired officers, scholars from the academia and researchers from related research institutions. To actuate this mandate, the centre was initially structured into 7 Directorates. However, the Chief of Army Staff (COAS) recently approved the inclusion of the Nigerian Army Museum as the 8th Directorate.

The Centre publishes Defence-related journals, organizes seminars and offers consultancy services in varied aspects of security. In addition, the Centre showcases new inventions, promotes inter-disciplinary studies and issues annual reports. Ultimately, the aim is to provide necessary advisory services to the COAS for improved decision-making and policy formulation. The Centre presently operates from a temporary site at No. 5 Lekki Close Garki II, Abuja but the permanent site is located opposite the Post-Service Housing Department at Mambilla Barracks Asokoro, Abuja..

2016 Jackson Lecture: Journalists Challenged on Professional Ethics

Nigerian journalists have been urged to obey rules guiding journalism so as to provide solid reporting with precision and ethical considerations to boost the professional status of journalism.

This was stressed in speeches delivered at the 2016 Jackson Annual Lecture tagged: 'Journalism Today: the Realities of Professional Practice' organized by the Department of Mass Communication, University of Nigeria, Nsukka,

Senior Special Assistant on Media and Publicity to Niger State Governor, Mr Babajide Orintusin described the practice of journalism as an all-comers affair as a result of the hijack of the profession by people without formal journalism training.

He regretted that the integrity of contemporary journalists had been compromised by economic hardships and the struggle to survive. “Journalists are being exploited by their employers and the society”, he said.

The media guru equally expressed disapproval with what he termed an “unholy allegiance of media Professionals to media owners”, especially those working with government owned media. “This kills the ideas of investigative journalism because you will not want to say something that is contrary to the views of the govt.”, he said.

Further, he revealed that sensationalism of news items and

headlines were other disturbing realities of journalism practice which many editors employ in order to sell their newspapers. He called on journalism gatekeepers to abide by the sacred norms which guide the practice of their profession.

Orintusin, acknowledged that journalists have played noble roles in the political, economic and social development and progress of the country. He however noted that, “We can make a difference by realizing that as journalists, we occupy a sensitive position in the society. We must at all times strive to uphold the professional ethics of the profession.”

The Country General Manager (Public and Government Affairs), ExxonMobil. Mr Paul Arinze while delivering his lecture on Business communication noted that the study of journalism prepared one for leadership and opened up an endless world for journalists.

“Studying mass communication is one of the best decisions you can make as today's communicator must necessarily become tomorrow's business leader”, he said.

The Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Benjamin Chukwuma Ozumba was at the event represented by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Administration) Prof Charles Igwe. The lecture was chaired by Professor Ndolo, while the then Head, Department of Mass Communication, Dr Greg Ezeah, led other staff of the Department to the occasion. Prof. Ozumba made the call at the Inauguration of Anti-Corruption Transparency Monitoring Unit (ACTU) in the University by the Independent Corrupt Practices and other Related Offences Commission (ICPC).

The Vice-Chancellor, who was represented by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Administration) Prof. Charles Igwe, noted that ACTU would serve as an “in-house Check mechanism to monitor, identify and address corruption prone areas within the system”

He expressed hope that the programmes of ACTU-UNN would help transform the mindset of members of the university community on the issue of corruption and help stamp out the menace in the system.

ACTU-UNN was in compliance with the approval of the Head of Service of the Federation empowering the ICPC to inaugurate ACTU in all government Ministries Departments and Agencies (MDAs)

Hassan, who was represented by Nzebubachi Chukwuma, said that ACTU was meant to awaken the consciousness of workers on the effect of corruption on the educational system and the nation at large. “ACTU is the eyes of the Commission (ICPC) in the MDAs, so are other staff in various offices of the institution”, he said

The Commissioner advised ACTU-UNN members to live above board and to be role models to other staff.

Some of the functions of ACTU, according to Ikeoha Chukwuma,

who presented a lecture on “The Role of Anti-Corruption and Transparency Monitoring Unit in the Fight Against Corruption in MDAs”, included; anti-corruption education and public enlightenment; monitoring budget implementation; developing code of ethics for staff and developing protection mechanism for informants and unit members.

The unit, according to Chukwuma, is also saddled with the responsibility of monitoring compliance with certain civil service rules such as suppression of records, false claim and falsification of records.

SERVICOM, FRSC Organise Sensitization Workshop on Road Safety

The Federal Road Safety Commission, (FRSC), in collaboration with the Servicom Unit, University of Nigeria, recently organised a two day sensitization workshop on how to apply safety on Nigeria highways while driving.

The Federal Road Safety Commission, Corps Marshal, Dr. Boboye Oyeyemi who was

represented by the Deputy Corps Marshal, Barrister Chidi Nwachukwu, disclosed that many road crashes which occurred in Nigerian were caused by reckless driving; hence he called on Nigerian road users to make use of the Highway Code in order to save lives while driving.

He made this remark during the Sensitization workshop for the

University of Nigeria Staff titled: "Vehicle Administration and Safety on Nigerian Road." He emphasised that in order to save lives and property on the road, FRSC had commenced and sustained special operations such as the 'Operation Scorpion' which was targeted at both tankers and trailers with special checks for safety valves, retro-reflective tapes

and tyres.

According to him as part of the Corps mandate which is to save lives and reduce fatalities in the event of Road Traffic Crashes-RTCs, FRSC have commenced an advisory enforcement on the use of rear seatbelts. He advised Nigerians to call #122# in case of any emergency on the road such as accident or overloading.

Dr. Boboye also stated that to reduce road crashes on the highway, the FRSC has introduced the Road Transport Safety Standardization Scheme (RTSSS), which would supervise and monitor the operations of Fleet operators and ensure strict adherence to standards and ultimately reduce RTC.

Furthermore, the FRSC had also established a Driving School Standardization Programme (DSSP) with the aim to standardize and create uniformity in driver education. According to him, the programme would ensure that only driving schools that meet the requirements of the FRSC are

certified for operations in Nigeria.

He advised road users to always purchase new tyres instead of "Tokunbo tyres" as they are expired. Vehicle owners are encouraged to always check tyre production dates and its expiring date because an appropriate life span for tyre replacement is 4 years from the date of manufacture (DOM).

Meanwhile, the Vice-Chancellor, University of Nigeria, Prof. Benjamin Chukwuma Ozumba, who was represented by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Administration), Prof. Charles Igwe, applauded the FRSC for her effort to reduce road crashes in

Nigeria highways.

Prof. Ozumba, urged the FRSC to keep enlightening the public through sensitization and workshop programmes of this nature on the essence of Highway Code while driving on the roads.

He also appealed to them to find a lasting solution to the bad roads as these were the major cause of road crashes.

VC Forges Collaborations with Swedish Universities

The Vice-Chancellor of the University of Nigeria, Prof Benjamin Ozumba on June 26, 2016, led a delegation from the University of Nigeria to Swedish universities for discussions on possible collaborations in the areas of academic and research corporations.

The visit was on the invitation of Dr. Andreas Gothenberg, the Executive Director of Swedish Foundation for International Cooperation in Research and Higher Education (STINT).

In the Vice-Chancellor's entourage were Professor Kenneth Ofokansi, Director, Research and International Collaboration and Professor Joy Ezeilo of the Faculty

of Law whose earlier private visits to Sweden provided the initial impetus to seek collaboration with Swedish universities.

During the visit the delegation from the University of Nigeria was hosted first by Dr. Gothenberg who revealed to the UNN team that STINT had a number of programs to support academic cooperation in all fields of learning between Swedish and non-European universities.

Other Swedish universities that played host to the UNN delegation included Uppsala University, Stockholm University, KTH Royal Institute of Technology and Swedish University of Agricultural Sciences.

Fall out of the discussion with KTH Royal Institute of Technology required the University of Nigeria to nominate two post-doctoral researchers (from the Faculty of Engineering and Department of Economics) to work with Dr. Mark Howells of KTH with the view of developing fundable/bankable proposals for submission to funding Agencies including the African Development Bank. Dr Howells is the Coordinator of Europe's Energy Modeling Group.

Also, the University of Nigeria is expected to nominate three members of staff to participate in a conference being organized by a team from KTH in Tanzania in September. The team will be
