employment, economic independence and self-actualization.

University of Nigeria student, Chizoma Emeka Joshua has emerged second in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Regional Universities Speech Context organized by the Inter-Governmental Action Group, (GIABA) on Money Laundering in West Africa.

The context, held at the

University of Nigeria, Enugu C a m p u s (UNEC) on August 6, 2019, f i e l d e d candidates from G a m b i a, Liberia, Nigeria and Sierraleon.

Joshua from the Faculty of Law, UNEC bested candidates from Gambia and Liberia, while a

candidate from Sierraleon clinched the first position.

Speaking on the theme of the Competition, "The Impact of Money Laundering and Terrorist Financing on Economies of West Africa", the Director and CEO of Nigeria Financial Intelligence Unit (NFIUI) and National Correspondent of Inter-Government Action Group, Against Money Laundering in West Africa, Modibbo Hamman Tukur, thanked the Director General of GIABA for choosing

Nigeria, especially the University of Nigeria for hosting the year's context and equally combating Money Laundering and Terrorism financing within the region.

Tukur praised the staff of GIABA and that of the University of Nigeria for supporting the programme. Mr.

Modibbo urged the contestants to be sportsmanly during their debates as the programme was established to mold youths towards rising against anything that could lead to illicit money laundering and terrorism financing.

The Director/CEO of (NFIU) stated that GIABA was established by the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) Authority of Head of States Government in 2000, which has been a major response and contribution of

ECOWAS to the fight against money laundering. "GIABA is a specialized institution of ECOWAS that is responsible for strengthening the capacity of member states towards the prevention and control of money laundering and terrorism financing in the region", he said. He enumerated that it was in furtherance of its mandate that it organized the competition amongst the Universities in the Anglophone member states of the group.

He therefore, stated that the world is presently being challenged by the menace of money laundering and terrorism financing and "our sub-region is not insulated from the adverse consequence of these crimes". And that the effect of these on the financial system is enormous that it demands for a concerted effort by all and sundry in combating same.

Meanwhile, the Director General GIABA Justice Kimelabalou Aba in his own welcome address said that the primary mandate of GIABA "is to develop measures to protect the economics of member states from abuse and the laundering of the proceeds of crimes and strengthen cooperation amongst its members state". He further, added that GIABA is a Financial Task Force (TATF) that ensures regional states' compliance with acceptable international AML/CFF standards.

he 59<sup>th</sup> Founders' Day celebration of the University of Nigeria has come and gone, but the exciting memories it left behind cannot vanish in a jiffy.

Founders' Day celebration is an annual prestigious event used to mark the anniversary of the university which was founded in October 1960.

The 59<sup>th</sup> Founders' Day celebrations, which held from 6<sup>th</sup> - 11<sup>th</sup> October 2019 was unique. The celebrations had touches of excellence with some surprised packages that announced the dawn of a new era to guests and members of

the university community.

In what appeared to be a deviation from what the

university community had accepted as a norm for Founders' Day programmes,

the celebrations started with a thanksgiving service instead of the usual capping with one. The service, held at St. Peter's Chaplaincy, Nsukka campus, was the first official church outing of the new Vice-Chancellor, Prof Charles Igwe, whose tenure started in June 2019.

Prof Igwe used the platform to announce to the university community that he "will work for the benefit of every person in the university, not for the interest of a section or group of persons".

He acknowledged that the task ahead of him was enormous, but said that with the support of the people and prayers to God, he would achieve legacy results for the university.

Besides the offertory item, the Vice-Chancellor presented a book from National Geographic on "Pope Francis and the New Vatican" to the Chaplaincy. The presentation was a gesture unique to the new university administration.

The Founders' Day exhibition mounted at the Nnamdi Azikiwe Library showcased innovations by staff, units and departments within the past one year. It was a programme that showed that the culture of innovative research was still entrenched in the university. On display were art works of irresistible magnificence, metal fabrications, fabrics of different shades and colour, cakes of high nutritional value, among other things.

"It is high time we took these products outside the shelf", the Vice-Chancellor told the exhibitors. Prof Igwe challenged the various departments and units to commercialise their research outputs and bring back revenue to the university. He said the era of stalking research innovations in shelf was over; every productive research must add value to the university and to the individual researcher.

The Vice-Chancellor also challenged the departments of Music and Theatre and Film Studies during their performances. He told them that they had better talents than those cheered by millions of people in the society. "All you need to do is

reach out and the revenue will come", he told the performing staff and students at the music and drama nights.

The peak of the celebration was the Founders' Day lecture delivered by the Governor of Ebonyi State, His Excellency, Chief David Nweze Umahi. His lecture was titled "Preparing Ebonyi State for Tomorrow's Zero Oil Economy". Chief Umahi said that Nigeria had the capacity to survive outside revenue from crude oil, though the adaptation would not happen overnight. The survival depended on government's development of other sectors of the economy which can be fast tracked by restructuring of Nigeria's economy.

The restructuring, according to Umahi would require the unbundling of items in the exclusive and concurrent lists to create room for component states to generally shoulder the responsibilities of their citizens. He said his administration was already preparing Ebonyi state to survive outside revenue from oil.

The Dignity of Man Debate, which was an interesting part of the Founders' Day programme, had students argue on the propriety or otherwise of legislation that prescribes death sentence to rape offenders on second trial. Winners of the debate were given cash prizes as well as brand new phones.
